



Communication




- Emails to staff are to be sent to the school email address as provided above.

Communication Folders

- All students in K-2 have a communication folder.
- Please check the folder each evening for correspondence from the school or teacher.
- Please empty the folder each evening.
- When information needs to be handed in at school, please place it in the communication folder.
- This folder must remain in your child's bag at all times.





Morning Routines

MORNINGS

- Students to arrive between 8:30-9am
- At 9am, students assemble under the COLA and line up in their class lines.
- Students are asked to be sitting in their class line by the last chime of the bell.
- The side gate next to our COLA will be locked at 9am.
- Late arrivals must report to the office and get a late slip.

WET WEATHER MORNINGS

- K-2 students are encouraged to wear a raincoat. No umbrellas please.
- If it is raining heavily in the morning, then students will go straight to their classroom.







Afternoon Routines

AFTERNOONS

- 3pm pick up Please be on time.
- K-2 students will wait under the COLA for parent/carer pick up
- If you make arrangements for someone else to pick up your child other than carers (i.e. grandparents), then please let the school know as early as possible via email or phone call.
- Students in Years 3-6 will exit past the office and wait at the front of the school under the sheltered area. If they have a sibling in K-2, they can meet them under the COLA.
- K-2 pick up arrangements note went home earlier this term (i.e. kiss and drop, collected by an older sibling etc.).
- On entry to the school, we kindly ask that parents and families use the side entrance to the COLA, collect their K-2 child and exit via the stairs or ramp heading up to classrooms and make their exit past the office, and back down the ramp.
- This loop around the school, will ensure the smooth and safe exit of all families.

WET WEATHER AFTERNOONS

• K-2 students are encouraged to wear a raincoat. No umbrellas please.







Kiss and Drop

- The 'Kiss and Drop' traffic zone has particular rules, and both local Council Rangers and NSW Police regularly patrol this area. The 'Kiss and Drop' zone is located on Nabthorpe Parade and operates between 8.00 am to 9:30 am and 2:30 pm to 4.00 pm.
- A teacher supervises students at the 'Kiss and Drop' zone located at the front of the school, both in the morning, from 8.30am and in the afternoon, from 3.00pm.

• The 'Kiss and Drop' is a **no parking area** and **drivers have a maximum of two minutes** to drop-off or pick-up their passengers. The driver has to be **within**


three metres of the vehicle at all times.

- Safety tips for drivers using the 'Kiss and Drop' zone:
 - Always drop off or pick up your child from the designated zone and follow the school's procedures
 - Drivers should remain in their vehicles, at all times, in the Kiss and Drop zone
 - Make sure children use the Safety Door (the rear footpath side door) to get in and out of the car
 - Always park legally.
 - U-turns and three-point turns are banned, at all times, on Nabthorpe Parade in front of the school.
- Safety tips for students:
 - Always get in and out of the vehicle through the Safety Door, the rear footpath-side door
 - Stay buckled up until the vehicle has stopped in the Kiss and Drop area
 - Make sure your school bag and other items are in a safe position, such as on the floor
 - Be ready to get out of the vehicle with your belongings when the car has stopped, and you have unbuckled your seatbelt.
 - It is important that you discuss your pick-up arrangements with your child **every** day, so they are certain of where to meet you. Please communicate any changes or issues directly to your child's class teacher.

Eating at School

There will be three opportunities for your child to refuel throughout the school day.

- Crunch&Sip morning session
 - o A time to eat fruit or vegetables and sip water
 - Please ensure that your child's drink bottle is labelled with your child's name
- Recess eating time 10:55am
- Lunch eating time 1:20pm
- Teach your child how to open and close their containers and place their lunchbox in their bag.
- Pack cutlery, if needed
- Ensure food can be eaten without reheating
- Use ice-packs
- Minimise the number of containers your child is carrying to the playground.
- Label all personal items with your child's name.







Recess and Lunch

- Eating time is held in classrooms.
- Students who have not finished eating can continue to eat their food in the playground although they must be seated.
- Labelled class tubs are located under the COLA for students to place their food containers inside for safe keeping and require collection at the end of playtime.







Allergies



We have students attending our school who have severe allergic reactions to peanuts and nut products.

We kindly encourage that you <u>do not</u> pack any nut products in your child's recess and lunch.











Student Safety and Birthdays Celebrations

Our school has a Health and Safety committee that ensures our policy and procedures are in line with Department of Education student health and hygiene guidelines.

Our school policies are aimed at protecting sensitive children from exposure to allergens present in food substances and to ensure adherence to new hygiene practices around minimising exposure to infectious diseases.

The Health and Safety committee has identified that the activity of bringing in food to celebrate a child's birthday as being a high risk to children with anaphylaxis and food allergy conditions, of which there is an increasing number in our schools. Additionally, we are unable to ensure that food products have been handled in line with hygiene and infection control procedures. Therefore, to mitigate this risk and to ensure the safety of all children, our policy is that you <u>do not</u> send food, such as cakes, lollies etc. in with your child to celebrate his or her birthday with their class.

Teachers will continue to acknowledge and make children feel special on their birthday but it will be done without the sharing of food.







Lost Property

- The lost property box is located outside the office.
- To minimise losing property, all parents are encouraged to label all of their child's property, including uniform, hats, lunch boxes and water bottles.











Bringing Valuables to School

- We ask that all students do not bring valuable items to school.
- Students may bring a small toy from home, labelled with your child's name. However, the school takes no responsibility for lost items.
- If it is considered valuable by your child, then it is best to keep it safe at home.

Homework

Homework activities at home consist of the following:

- A K-6 wellbeing activity is sent home Week 4, commencing in Term 2. This replaces normal weekly homework.
- A homework grid is sent home Fridays and returned Thursday
- K-2 Home Reading Little Learners Love Literacy online
- Mathletics online mathematics activities

Some tips for parents about homework:

- Get into a routine.
- Set a regular time to complete reading online and read 5-10 minutes daily. It's great for your child to read aloud to you.
- We hope you enjoy sharing time with your child completing these activities.

Early Stage One (Kindergarten)	5 minutes
Stage One (Year 1 & 2)	5-10 minutes
Stage Two (Year 3 & 4)	10-15 minutes
Stage three (Year 5 & 6)	15 minutes+









Little Learners Love Literacy Online - Home Reading Program



Log in details for Kindergarten will be sent home when students have been explicitly taught Stage One sounds m, s, f, a, p, t, c, I and blending these sounds to read simple words.

Students are encouraged to read the same book for a minimum of three (3) times. Rereading books contributes to developing pronunciation, intonation (Intonation is the changing of tone in a person's voice when sounding out particular words. It often reflects emotion, emphasis and attitudes when speaking), and word recognition. By hearing and seeing the same words in context, children learn to associate visual symbols with their corresponding sounds, enhancing their reading fluency.








NFPS Home Reading Program

Home Reading Log Parent Information:

- Students are asked to read for at least five (5) minutes each night.
- Only one (1) session may be recorded each night during the term.
- Parents may record up to seven (7) nights of home reading on the log card each week.
- The date and the name of the book should be recorded along with a parent signature.
- The same book may be recorded three (3) times only onto the log card. If your child is reading a longer chapter book, it can be recorded more than three (3) times as long as the chapters/page numbers have been recorded.
- After 100 sessions of home reading, children will be given a Principal's Reading Award with 3 Pelican Tokens and your child will be a member of the 100 Club.
- Each time 100 sessions are recorded another Principal's Reading Award will be presented. Enjoy your reading!!

Attendance



What do I do if my child:

..will be going on a holiday during the school term?

- Parent/carers will need to notify the front office of their child's intended leave. They will need to fill in and return the Leave of Absence form indicating the duration of your leave, the reason for the leave and the date of return.
- The Department of Education does not accept family holidays and travel as reasons for exemption from school. An application for a Certificate of
 Extended Leave for Travel must be applied for through the school office for leave of more than 5 days and approved by the Principal. The application
 needs to be made a minimum of ten school days before travel and documents such as air/ship/train tickets, accommodation confirmation or a travel
 itinerary for domestic and/or international travel must be provided.

..has been absent from school?

• If your child is sick and cannot attend school, the parent/carer will need to respond either via the School Bytes app that is sent from the school or you will need to send a note upon your child's return explaining your child's absence, listing the date/s of absence, and this should be handed to the classroom teacher

..comes to school late

• If your child comes to school late, a parent must accompany the child to the office to explain the reason for the late arrival. Your child will then receive a note with their arrival time to present to their classroom teacher. A record of lateness will be made on the roll.

..has to leave school early


- If your child must leave early, early leave notes must be obtained from the school office by a parent. The parent will be asked the reason why they need to leave early and this will be recorded on the roll. Your child will then be called to the office for you to collect.

The assessment is not a test but provides teachers with useful information to help support your child's learning at school.








Literacy and Numeracy Rotations

Students in K-2 will engage in rotations involving Literacy and Numeracy activities. These activities are designed for consolidation of concepts and skills explicitly taught in the classroom.

Many activities involve hands-on experiences. Research shows that when children are engaged in activities that require movement, talking and listening it activates multiple areas of the brain and they are more likely to retain information.







Synthetic Phonics Program

We are excited to be helping your little one with a fun, engaging and evidence-based literacy program this year.

What can you expect?

We teach with Little Learners Love Literacy® – a structured and explicit program with engaging multisensory activities. It is carefully sequenced in seven stages to teach children the 44 sounds of the English language and the principles of the alphabetic code (that each speech sound can be represented by different groups of letters, such as the sound /ī/ as in I, sky, pie, ice, cycle, and that a letter (or group of letters) can represent different sounds, such as the letter 'y' in yes, gym, funny, sky.



Multisensory activities engage more than one sense at a time. Using sight, hearing, movement, and touch gives students more than one way to connect with what they are learning.






Synthetic Phonics Program

Did you know that learning the alphabetic code gives children the knowledge to read and spell 84% of ALL words? (Hanna, Hanna, Hodges, and Rudorf, 1966)

Kindergarten

We start with teaching the simple code (single sounds and consonant digraphs i.e. 'ch', 'sh', 'th' etc. in Stages 1–4. We will focus on phonics and phonemic awareness to build the strongest foundations for reading and spelling success. We will also focus on building vocabulary and oral language skills to develop equally strong foundations for comprehension and writing.



Meet Milo and friends

In the first few weeks of term, Kindergarten will be learning our Stage 1 letters and sounds. We will be enjoying the Milo's Birthday Surprise storybook, meeting a new character and sound regularly. We will also learn to blend sounds to say words and segment them for spelling, as well as learning handwriting.



Once we finish teaching Stage 1, we will start to use Pip and Tim decodable books. These are our secret to success – our 'no tricks' books. Each story practises the sounds and letters that we have taught, so children will be able to read the books themselves by sounding out and blending (and no guessing!).

Practise reading and decoding

When reading with your child, encourage them to sound out to read unknown words. Remember that this is the beginning of your child's learning to read journey and, just as when they were learning to walk, your child will need support to build confidence reading.
